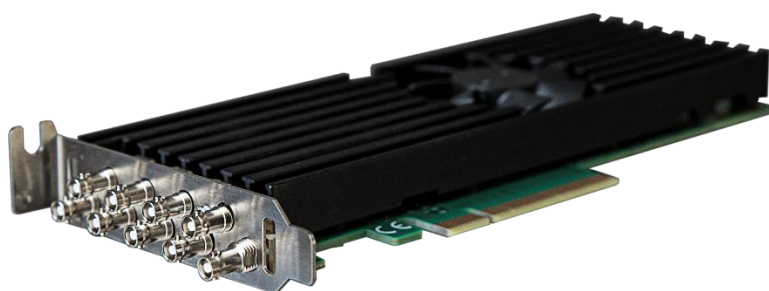

The DELTA-12G-elp-h 4i2c and 4o2c cards have a “multi-card synchronization” feature allowing to propagate synchronization flags between multiple devices by daisy-chaining them through a dedicated connector. The daisy-chaining of the card is done using a ribbon cable.

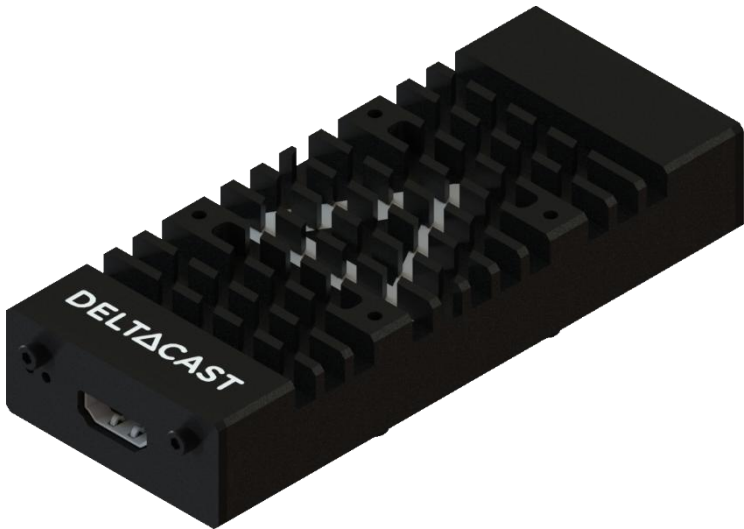

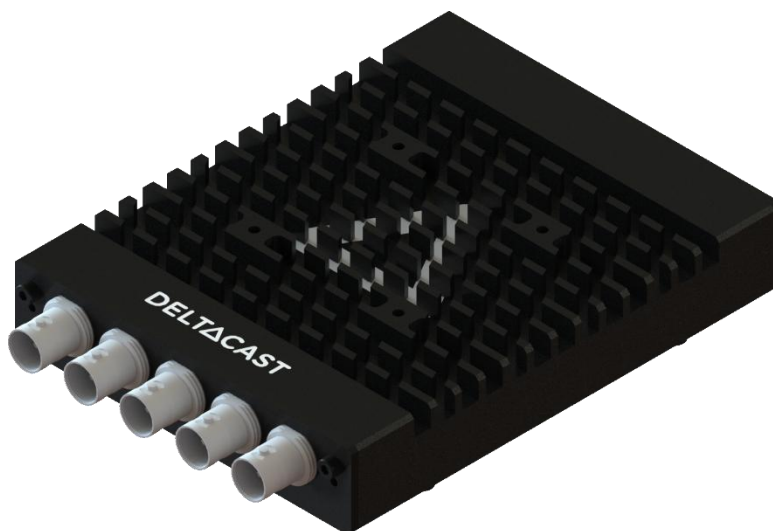

5 INSTALLATION

5.1 Hardware installation

This chapter assume you are installing one or several DELTACAST devices and accompanying software on a new computer or a computer that has not been used before with such a card.

Before carrying on with the hardware installation, please shut down the PC and unplug the power supply cable from your PC case.



***Caution:** Static electricity from your body can damage sensitive electronic components on the DELTACAST devices. Please avoid touching the chips and other components and try to handle the card by its edges. Also drain static electricity from your body by touching a bare metal surface on your computer chassis before you install or remove any parts of your system. If you have grounding wrist strap, use it while handling DELTACAST devices.*

If you wish to upgrade the driver with a new version downloaded from the DELTACAST web site, please consult the appropriate topics in this guide.



***Caution:** Please read carefully the detailed instructions that follow before attempting to install any software or hardware component of this product. Inappropriate operation may result in a broken or malfunctioning system.*

5.1.1 PCIe Cards

5.1.1.1 PCIe bus considerations

Not all PCIe bus controllers offer the same performances. Depending on the platform they are plugged in, DELTACAST devices could not be able to support full-speed transfers on all their channels, because of a bandwidth limitation on the motherboard itself.

When selecting the host motherboard, always get that point into account.

Moreover, depending on the device you use, the PCI Express slot needed might be different from one device to another.

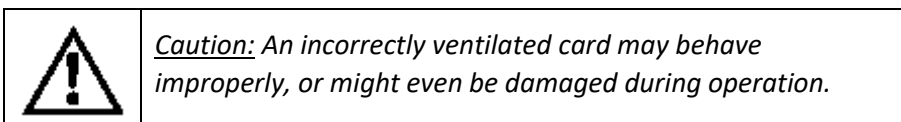
2 use cases are to be taken into account:

- Plugging a device in a less performant PCIe slot:
The device has restricted performances.
- Plugging a device in a more performant PCIe slot:
Make sure that your motherboard can downgrade the PCIe slot to fit to the device.

5.1.1.2 What you need for installation

Once the PC case is opened, identify an appropriate PCI Express slot. If any doubt exists, please refer to the documentation of your motherboard.

Among the available PCIe slots, it is preferable to choose the highly ventilated ones and to select a smart repartition of cards for better heat dissipation.



Select the most appropriate slot for each of the DELTACAST devices you wish to install, and remove the metal plate located on the PC case in regard to those slots. Don't lose the screws, as you will need them to fasten the cards later on.

5.1.1.3 Installing in the computer

To install the cards, repeat the following steps for each device:

- Carefully align the card with its selected PCIe slot.
- Slide the card towards the slot until it touches. Make sure that the bracket of the card slips into the opening left by the metal plate you have just removed.
- Once the card touches its slot and is correctly aligned, press it into the connector until it is firmly in place.
- Secure the card by fastening its bracket to the PC case using the screw you removed one moment ago.

Once all your devices are installed, close your PC case, plug in the power supply cable and turn it on to proceed with software installation.



Caution – HOT SURFACE

The heatsink may remain hot after system shutdown. Wait approximately 5 to 10 minutes before handling the card to avoid the risk of burns.

5.1.2 FLEX Solution

5.1.2.1 What you need for installation

- A computer with an empty appropriate PCI Express slot,
- a external « PCI Express 150W-ATX » power cable,
- a [PCI Express gateway card](#),

5.1.2.2 Installing

5.1.2.2.1 Installing a DELTA-gwy

This chapter is only applicable to [DELTA-gwy family's products](#).

5.1.2.2.1.1 PCIe bus considerations

Not all PCIe bus controllers offer the same performances. Depending on the platform they are plugged in, DELTACAST devices could not be able to support full-speed transfers on all their channels, because of a bandwidth limitation on the motherboard itself.

When selecting the host motherboard, always get that point into account.

Moreover, depending on the device you use, the PCI Express slot needed might be different from one device to another.

2 use cases are to be taken into account:

- Plugging a device in a less performant PCIe slot:
The device has restricted performances.
For example, a [DELTA-gwy 316-8](#) is meant to be usable with 8 FLEX modules when it is installed in a PCI Express 3.0 x16 slot. If it were to be installed in a PCI Express 3.0 x8 slot instead, it would only be capable handling 4 FLEX modules correctly.
- Plugging a device in a more performant PCIe slot:
Make sure that your motherboard can downgrade the PCIe slot to fit to the device.

5.1.2.2.1.2 External power supply considerations

[DELTA-gwy](#) cards need external power supply in order to operate.

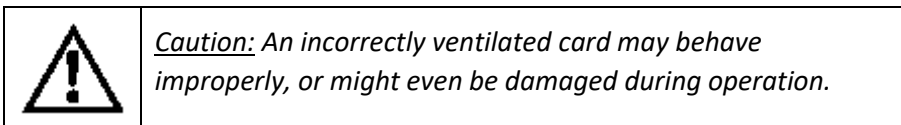
2 things are important to be taken into account:

- Your alimentation must be capable to provide the needed energy for the card along with the energy needed for the rest of your computer.
- You need to have an external « PCI Express 150W-ATX » power cable for the card.

5.1.2.2.1.3 What you need for installation

Once the PC case is opened, identify an appropriate PCI Express slot. If any doubt exists, please refer to the documentation of your motherboard.

Among the available PCIe slots, it is preferable to choose the highly ventilated ones and to select a smart repartition of cards for better heat dissipation.



Select the most appropriate slot for each of the DELTACAST devices you wish to install, and remove the metal plate located on the PC case in regard to those slots. Don't lose the screws, as you will need them to fasten the cards later on.

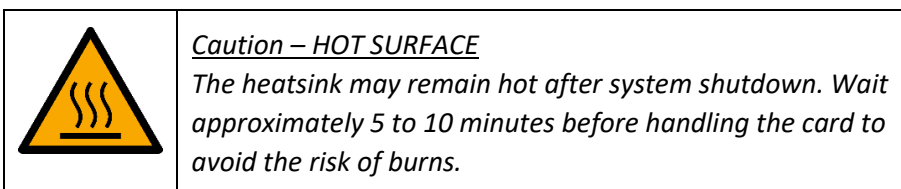
Also, identify the external « PCI Express 150W-ATX » power cable you will use and make sure they are long enough to go from the power supply until the card.

5.1.2.2.1.4 Installing in the computer

To install the cards, repeat the following steps for each device:

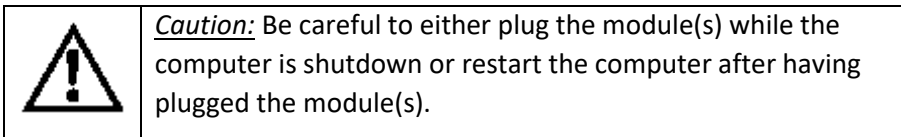
- Carefully align the card with its selected PCIe slot.
- Slide the card towards the slot until it touches. Make sure that the bracket of the card slips into the opening left by the metal plate you have just removed.
- Once the card touches its slot and is correctly aligned, press it into the connector until it is firmly in place.
- Secure the card by fastening its bracket to the PC case using the screw you removed one moment ago.
- Connect « PCI Express 150W-ATX » power cable to the « PCI Express 150W-ATX » connector of the card.

Once all your devices are installed, close your PC case, plug in the power supply cable and go on with the [FLEX module\(s\) installation procedure](#).



5.1.2.2.2 Installing FLEX module(s)

Once your [DELTA-gwy has been installed](#), what you need to do is connecting the [FLEX module\(s\)](#) you want to use to the [DELTA-gwy](#) with [specific cables](#).



5.1.2.2.2.1 Temperature Warning

In the FLEX modules, the enclosure also plays the role of heat dissipation for the electronics contained within the module.

As a consequence, when powered and when used FLEX modules can quickly reach high temperatures (close to 80°C – 176°F in certain conditions).

DELTACAST recommends to be very cautious when manipulating hot devices after usage. Allow sufficient cooling time before handling the module.

Providing adequate air flow to the FLEX heatsink allows drastically reducing the module temperature.

5.1.3 Cabling recommendations

It is recommended to use quality cables to avoid signal perturbations and unexpected behaviour.

5.1.3.1 For SDI reception and streaming:

Coaxial RG6 or RG59 (75 Ohms) cables are required and low loss cables are recommended for 3G (ex. BELDEN 1694A, 1505A or 1855A), for 6G (ex. BELDEN 1855A) and for 12G (ex. BELDEN 1855R).

5.1.3.2 For IP reception and streaming (SFP+ 10Gbit Ethernet transceiver):

10GbE SFP+ transceiver must be compatible with the "SFI" electric interface and work at 10.3125Gbps (SFF Committee SFF-8431: Specifications for Enhanced 8.5 and 10 Gigabit Small Form Factor Pluggable Module "SFP+").

- SFP+ 10GbE optical transceiver modules (10GBASE-SR, -LR or -ER)
- SFP+ Direct Attach copper Cables (10GSFP+Cu passive or active copper cable assembly). Warning: 10GSFP+Cu can only be used on systems with common grounds. Connecting systems with different ground potential with SFP+ direct attach cable results in a short and may cause damage.
- SFP+ Direct Attach optical cable.

5.1.3.3 For DisplayPort reception and streaming

5.2.1 Important note

5.2.1.1 Usage with 3rd party applications

In most cases, DELTACAST cards and FLEX modules are intended to be used with 3rd party applications which have been developed over the VideoMaster SDK (Software Development Kit).

If your 3rd party application vendor provided specific requirements or installation instructions for the DELTACAST device, they prevail over this guide.

Specifically, although DELTACAST generally recommends using the latest VideoMaster redistributable version available onto our download center at www.deltacast.tv, the application you are using the DELTACAST card with could require another – specific or older – version of VideoMaster, and in this case it is most of the time redistributed with the application. In case of doubt, we recommend double-checking this with the 3rd party application vendor.

5.2.1.2 Onboard firmware management

DELTACAST devices are based on FPGA and other programmable hardware components.

These cards store their firmwares in an onboard memory module, and the onboard firmware version must match the version of the software modules – drivers and libraries – installed on the host computer.

That is what the DELTACAST installation script registers and executes the firmware updater (FWUpdater) service, responsible for verifying and updating when needed the firmwares hosted on the devices present in the system. That check and update operation is performed during the installation process, as well as in background at each computer boot.

The update of an onboard firmware takes quite a long time – up to several minutes – and absolutely needs a computer restart in the end to complete. The computer restart is asked in a user interface when the update is done during the installation script execution. When the firmware update is performed during the operating system start, the need for a restart is signaled by specific error codes triggered by the VideoMaster libraries and – hopefully – handled by the calling application.

5.2.2 Windows software installation

The SDK supports the following versions of Windows:

VideoMaster SDK is fully operational on Windows 10 but due to some changes made by Microsoft into their security signature system, the VideoMaster drivers might not be correctly recognized. You are invited to contact Deltacast support service for any problem regarding signatures.

5.2.2.1 What you need for installation

To set up the machine wherein you will operate the DELTACAST cards, you must:

- First have successfully completed the hardware installation described above
- Run the installation script as detailed below

Always ensure yourself to use the package corresponding to the SDK version your application has been compiled for. In case of any doubt on the version to install, please contact the application supplier.



***Note:** You must ensure that, once logged in, you have sufficient privileges to complete both a driver installation and a standard application setup process.*

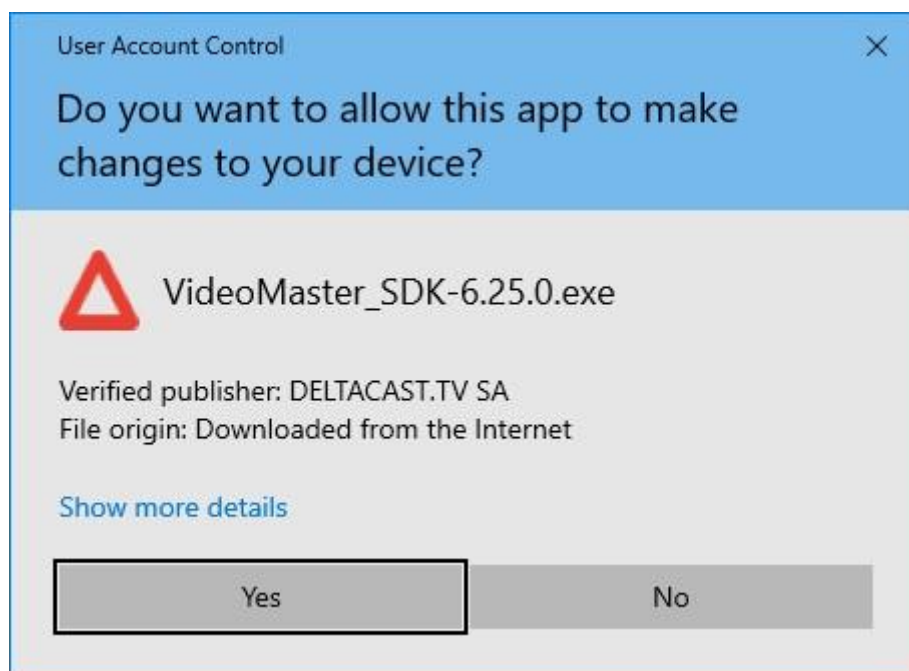
5.2.2.3 Installation procedure

By default the installation of a DELTACAST device and the VideoMaster is done through the installation executable.

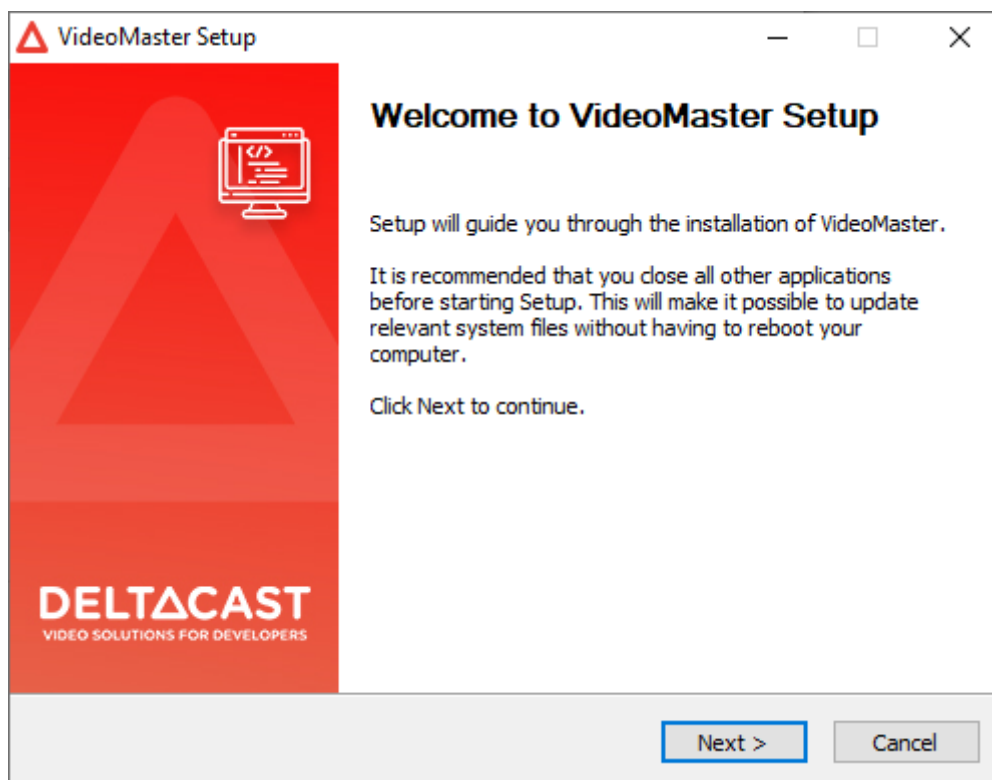


Note: The installer can also be launched in silent mode (no GUI). To do that, open an admin terminal and run the executable with the “/S” argument.

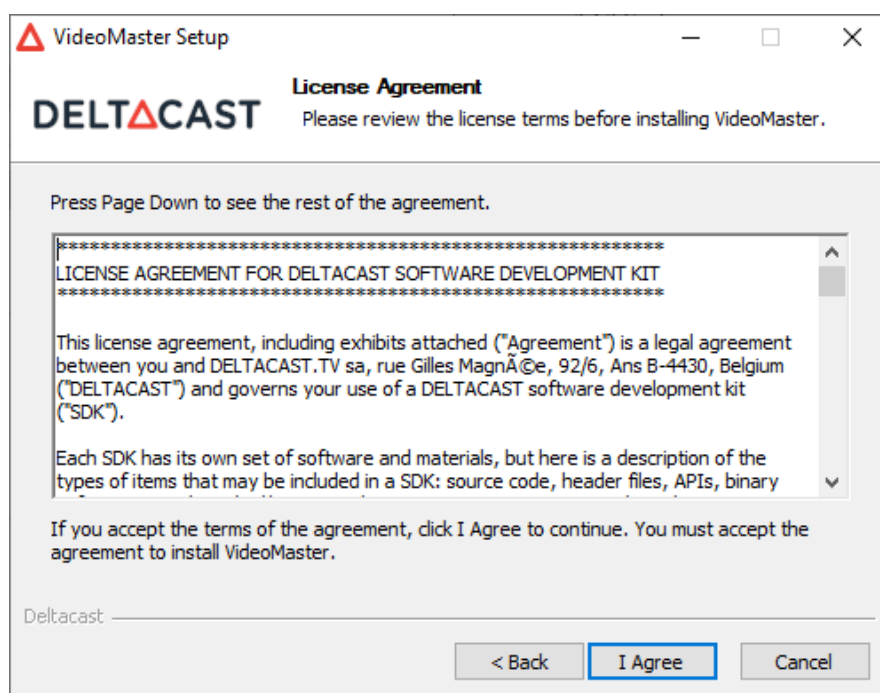
Upon launching the application by double clicking on the executable, you will be prompted to grant administrator rights.



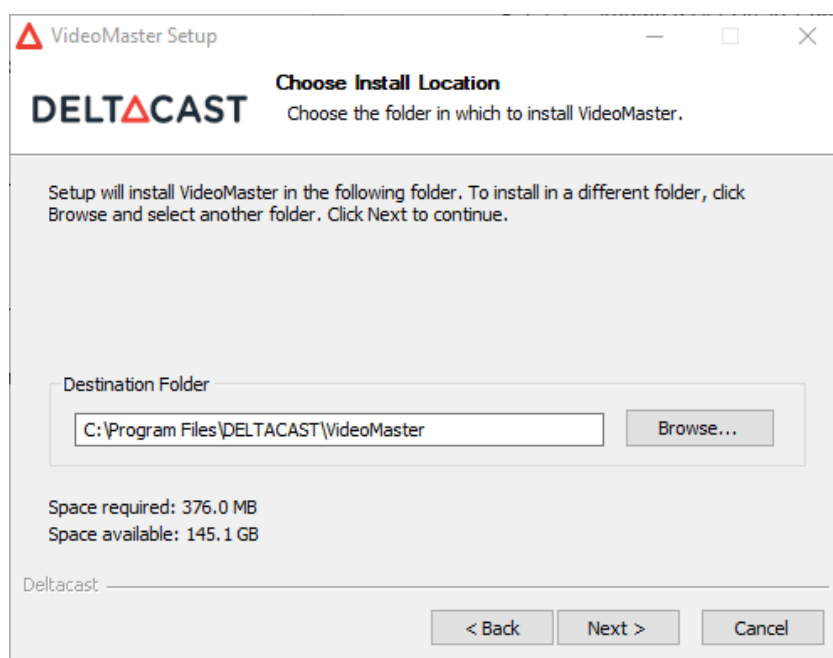
Click “Yes” to proceed.



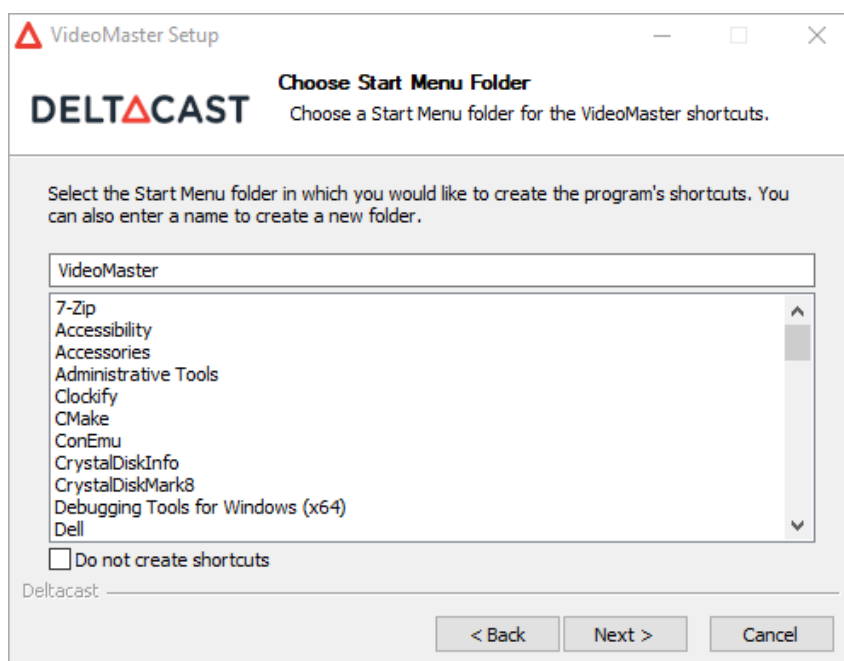
Next, you will need to review and accept the VideoMaster license agreement.



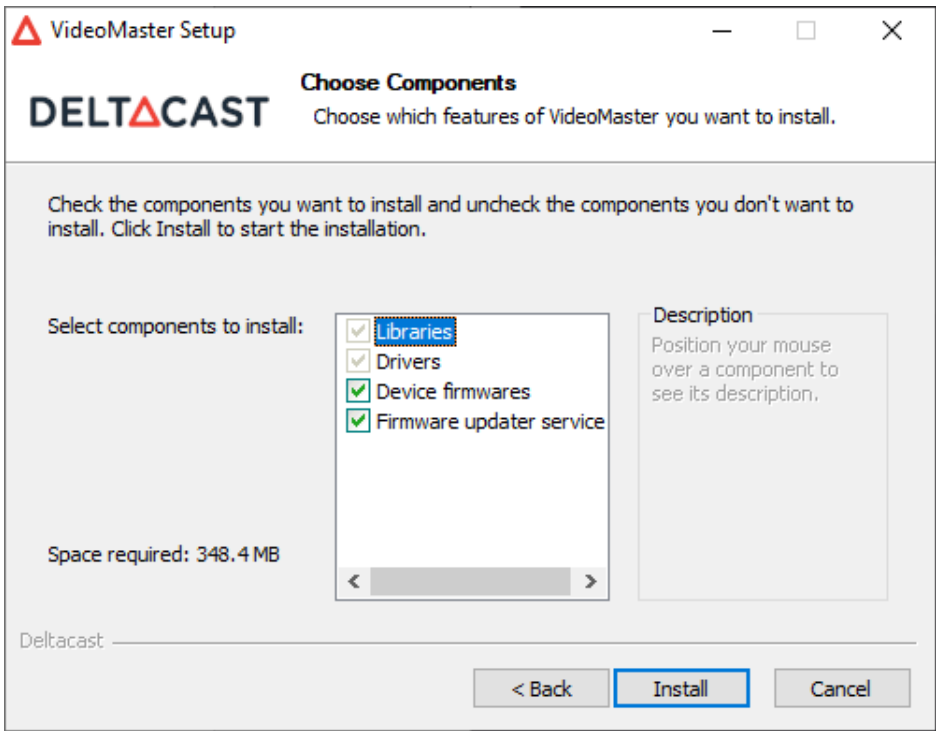
Following this, you'll be prompted to select an installation root directory. You can opt for the default directory or specify another one that better suits your needs.



The subsequent step will inquire if you wish to create Start Menu items. These optional items include shortcuts to the VideoMaster user guide and to the uninstallation executable.



You will now be able to choose which components you want to install according to your needs.



You'll notice some components are greyed out. These represent the device **drivers** and user space **libraries** (DLLs), which are essential for running any VideoMaster-related software. They form the bare minimum requirements. The VideoMaster DLLs will be copied to the System32 folder.

The **device firmware** files correspond to the boards' firmware, ensuring compatibility with the devices and libraries being installed.

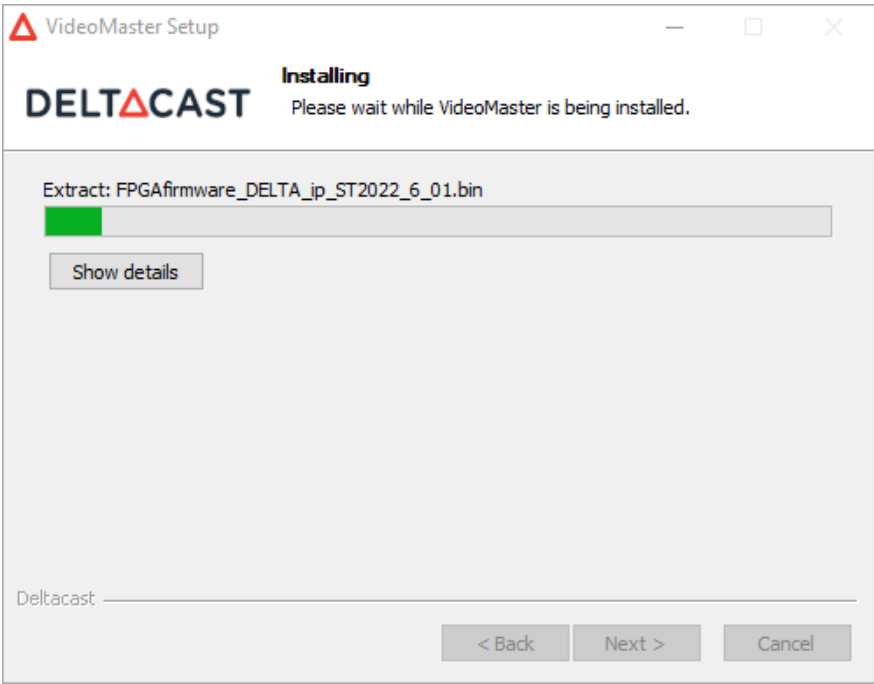
The **firmware updater service** corresponds to the FWUpdater executable, the FWUpdater viewer and their installation. This component needs the **device firmwares**. You can read more about the VideoMaster firmware updater later in this document.



***Note:** Except in specific conditions, we recommend letting the “Device firmwares” and “Firmware updater service” boxes ticked, as they are tightly coupled to the installed driver versions*

Once you are ready, click on the “Install” button to proceed.

The actual installation will now begin.



Toward the end of the installation, if selected in the component selection page, the **firmware updater** will attempt to update the device's firmware. A terminal emulator window will pop up, providing updates on the firmware update status.

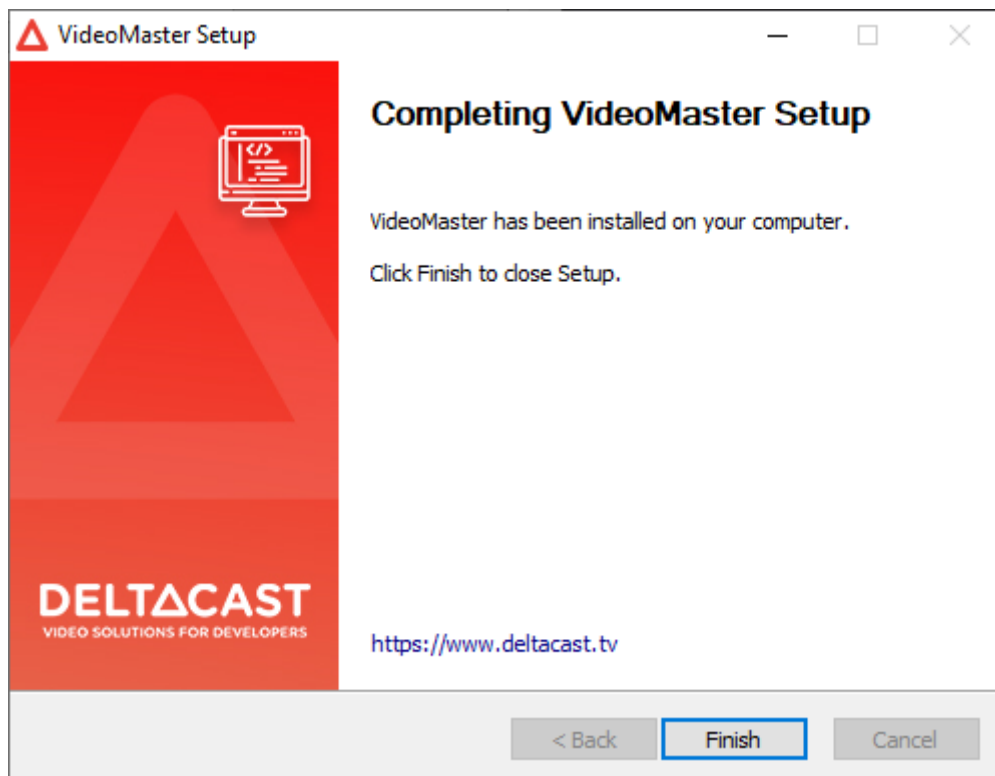

Caution: *Firmware update operation could take quite a long time (up to 3 minutes) if onboard firmware is being updated. Do not interrupt the installation process!*

After a firmware update, a reboot is always mandatory to use the device. A dialog will offer to reboot. It is recommended to select “Yes”.

The installation application will also offer to open de VideoMaster user guide.



5.2.2.4 Adding a DELTACAST devices to a system already equipped with other DELTACAST devices

Adding or replacing a DELTACAST device on a system already equipped with a DELTACAST device issued from the same family is transparent for the user. There is no need to re-install the driver and the FWUpdater service will update the device firmware in background if needed.

Note that in event of firmware update, the system needs to be rebooted in order to finalize the update. Your DELTACAST device will not be functional unless you reboot.

Adding a DELTACAST device from a different family than the one already/previously present in the system requires to run the installation application like explained in the previous chapter.

At the beginning of the installation, a dialog box will ask if the current software version should be uninstalled before proceeding with the new installation. **Please make sure to select “Yes”.**

For more information on the driver required depending on the device, see the "PRODUCTS, DRIVERS, and FIRMWARES" section.

5.2.2.5 Upgrading VideoMaster (6.25+)

To upgrade to a more recent version VideoMaster, just start the installation application.

At the beginning of the installation process, a dialog box will ask if the current software version should be uninstalled before proceeding with the new installation. **Please make sure to select “Yes”.**

5.2.2.6 Legacy considerations (-6.25)

If you are upgrading from an earlier version than VideoMaster 6.25, some additional steps might be required. The installer application will try to remove any VideoMasterHD*.dll in:

- C:\Windows\system32

And the “FWUpdater” directory in:

- C:\Program Files\DELTACAST\VideoMaster\

Please delete any remaining traces of VideoMaster in the paths you specified in your version of the now deprecated “install.bat”.

5.2.2.7 VideoMaster libraries

The VideoMaster libraries implement all the VideoMaster functionalities and act as the interface between the application, and the underlying drivers and hardware. They are mandatory to operate any DELTACAST card.

The VideoMaster libraries are a set of DLL files compiled for 64-bit Windows operating system. By default the VideoMaster installation application copies them automatically in System32 folder.

5.2.2.8 FWUpdater application

The FWUpdater application is launched at Windows startup by the FWUpdater service.

You can check the FWUpdater chapter for detail information about its usage.

	<i>Windows' "fast startup" setting, enabled by default on most recent systems, prevents services to run when booting up.</i> <i>We recommend disabling this setting to ensure that the FWUpdater service properly runs every time.</i>

5.2.2.9 Uninstalling the SDK

To uninstall the VideoMaster SDK, use the `Uninstall VideoMaster.exe` located at the root of the installation location, the default is `C:/Program Files/DELTACAST/VideoMaster/`.

5.2.2.10 Downgrading from 6.25+ to -6.25

If you wish to downgrade VideoMaster to an earlier version than 6.25.0, please make sure to uninstall the current version through its dedicated "uninstaller".

5.2.3 Linux software installation

The following table depicts the supported solutions on Linux:

Most of the steps of the VideoMaster Linux SDK installation may slightly differ from the procedure depicted here below, depending on your distribution.

The SDK requires a 64b Linux distribution and supports kernel version from 3.9.5 upwards. Note that it also requires glibc with version >= 2.31.

Refer to the release notes for the latest validated Linux kernel version.

DELTACAST qualified ARM64 support on the following ARM64 platform models:

- NVIDIA® Jetson AGX Xavier
- NVIDIA® Jetson AGX Orin



On some platforms using an NVIDIA® GPU, you may need to run the following command after having installed or uninstalled on of our cards (e.g. DELTA-12G-e-h 8c) if you no longer have access to the GUI:

5.2.3.2 A note on DKMS

VideoMaster now supports DKMS (Dynamic Kernel Module Support), an open-source project by Intel. DKMS automates the recompilation of kernel modules when your distribution's kernel updates, ensuring optimal compatibility and reducing developer workload.

5.2.3.3 Debian based distributions

5.2.3.3.1 Installation procedure

Dependencies:

- build-essential
- dkms

Before proceeding with the package installation, ensure that the necessary dependencies are installed, or that you have internet access for automatic installation via apt.

It is also recommended to make sure your system is up to date.

```
$ sudo apt update && sudo apt upgrade
```

and reboot in case any kernel upgrade has occurred.

To install the VideoMaster, open a terminal application and navigate to the directory containing the .deb archive. Install the package with:

```
$ sudo apt install ./VideoMaster_REDIST-<VERSION>-<ARCHITECTURE>.deb
```

You should see some output about DKMS installing the drivers for your kernels. Then the FWUpdater might perform a device firmware upgrade.

	Caution: <i>Firmware update operation could take quite a long time (up to 3 minutes) if onboard firmware is being updated. Do not interrupt the installation process!</i>

5.2.3.3.2 Upgrading VideoMaster (6.25+)

To upgrade VideoMaster, repeat the installation procedure with the new VideoMaster .deb archive.

5.2.3.3.3 Legacy considerations (-6.25)

If you are upgrading from an earlier version than VideoMaster 6.25, some additional steps might be required. The package installer will:

- Unload and remove the VideoMaster's kernel modules in `/lib/modules/${uname -r}/`
- Remove any VideoMaster rules in `/etc/udev/` and `/etc/udev/rules.d`
- Remove the FWUpdater in `/opt/deltacast/videomaster` and `/opt/deltacast.tv/videomaster` and the services `/lib/systemd/system/delta-firmware-updater.service`.
- Remove any `libvideomasterhd*.so*` in `/usr/lib/`, `/usr/local/lib`, `/usr/lib64`, `/usr/local/lib64`

Please delete any traces of VideoMaster remaining in paths not listed here before attempting an upgrade to 6.25+.

5.2.3.3.4 Uninstallation

To uninstall VideoMaster and its dependencies:

```
$ sudo apt autoremove videomaster
```

To remove VideoMaster only:

```
$ sudo apt remove videomaster
```

5.2.3.3.5 Downgrading from 6.25+ to -6.25

If you wish to downgrade VideoMaster to an earlier version than 6.25.0, please make sure to uninstall the current version.

5.2.3.3.6 Some useful commands

- Get the version of the currently installed VideoMaster

```
$ sudo apt list --installed | grep videomaster
videomaster/now 6.25.0 arm64 [installed,local]
```

- List the kernel modules installed with dkms

```
$ sudo dkms status
```

- Get device information with the FWUpdater

```
$ delta-firmware-updater device list
```

5.2.3.4 RPM based distributions

5.2.3.4.1 Installation procedure

Dependencies:

- make
- gcc
- epel-release
- dkms

To install dkms, you need to enable the epel (Extended Package for Enterprise Linux) repository. You can achieve this by installing the epel-release package:

```
$ sudo dnf install epel-release
```

Before proceeding with the package installation, ensure that the necessary dependencies are installed, or that you have internet access for automatic installation via dnf.

It is also recommended to make sure your system is up to date.

```
$ sudo dnf update
```

To install the VideoMaster SDK, open a terminal application and navigate to the directory containing the .rpm archive. Install the package with:

```
$ sudo dnf install ./VideoMaster_REDIST-<VERSION>-<ARCHITECTURE>.rpm
```

You should see some output about DKMS installing the drivers for your kernels. And then the FWUpdater might perform a device firmware upgrade.



Caution: *Firmware update operation could take quite a long time (up to 3 minutes) if onboard firmware is being updated. Do not interrupt the installation process!*

5.2.3.4.2 Upgrading VideoMaster (6.25+)

To upgrade VideoMaster, repeat the installation procedure with the new VideoMaster .rpm archive.

5.2.3.4.3 Legacy considerations (-6.25)

If you are upgrading from an earlier version than VideoMaster 6.25, some additional steps might be required. The package installer will:

- Unload and remove the VideoMaster kernel modules in `/lib/modules/${uname -r}/`
- Remove any VideoMaster rules in `/etc/udev/` and `/etc/udev/rules.d`
- Remove the FWUpdater in `/opt/deltacast/videomaster` and `/opt/deltacast.tv/videomaster` and the services `/lib/systemd/system/delta-firmware-updater.service`.
- Remove any `libvideomasterhd*.so*` in `/usr/lib/`, `/usr/local/lib`, `/usr/lib64`, `/usr/local/lib64`

Please delete any traces of VideoMaster remaining in paths not listed here before attempting an upgrade to 6.25+.

5.2.3.4.4 Uninstallation

To uninstall VideoMaster and its dependencies:

```
$ sudo dnf autoremove videomaster
```

To remove VideoMaster only:

```
$ sudo dnf remove videomaster
```

5.2.3.4.5 Downgrading from 6.25+ to -6.25

If you wish to downgrade VideoMaster to an earlier version than 6.25.0, please make sure to uninstall the current version.

5.2.3.4.6 Some useful commands

- Get the version of the currently installed VideoMaster

```
$ sudo dnf list installed | grep videomaster  
videomaster.x86_64 6.25.0 @local
```

- List the kernel modules installed with dkms

```
$ sudo dkms status
```

- Get device information with the FWUpdater

```
$ delta-firmware-updater device list
```

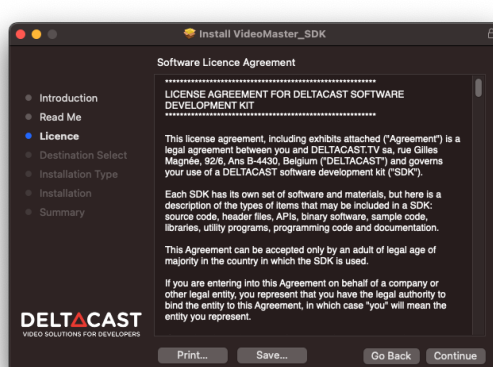
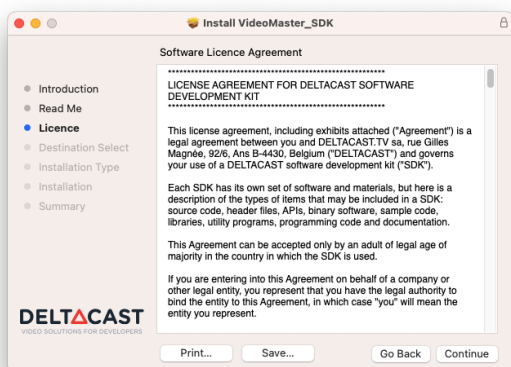


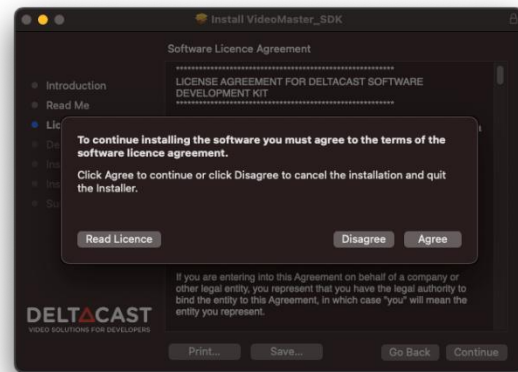
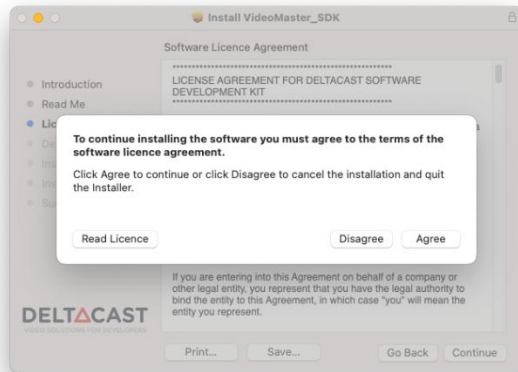
Note: The very first step is to uninstall the currently installed package, if any. In order to perform this action, please refer to the “Uninstalling VideoMaster” section of the “Installation Guide” related to that package.

Upon executing the installation package, you’ll be presented with this interface.

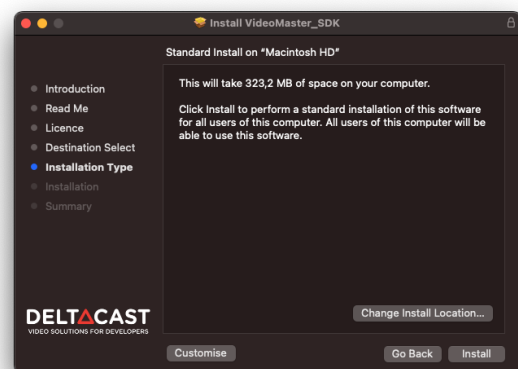
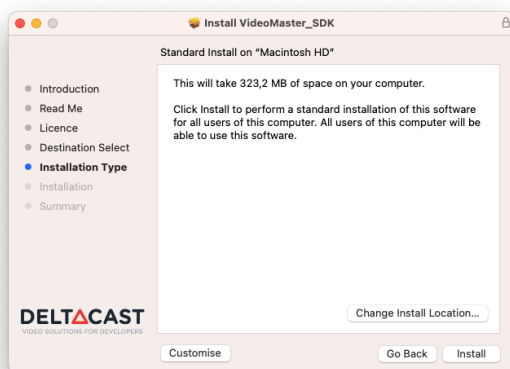


Then select *Continue* to display the next panels which display the license that needs to be approved.

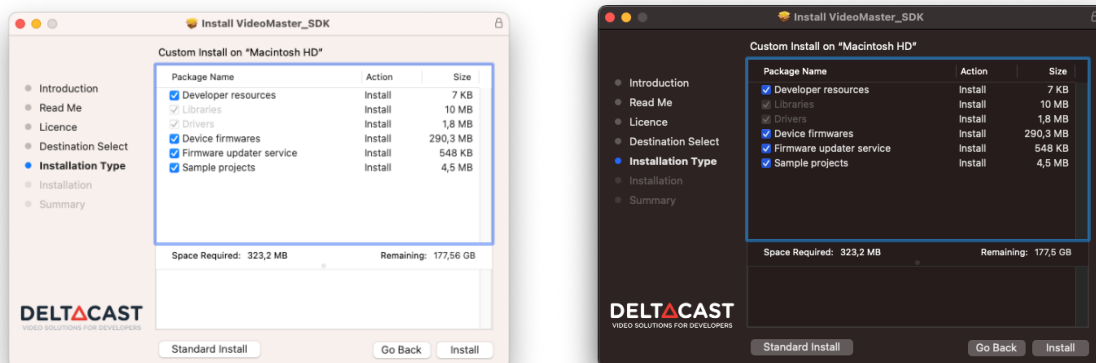




Upon approval of the license, you are being offered the choice between a standard installation and a customized one.



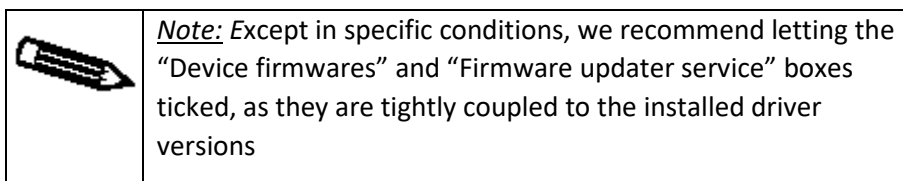
Should you opt for the customized installation, VideoMaster allows you to choose which components you want to install.



You'll notice some components are greyed out. These represent the device **drivers** and user space **libraries (Frameworks)**, which are essential for running any VideoMaster-related software. They form the bare minimum requirements.

The **device firmware** files correspond to the boards' firmware, ensuring compatibility with the devices and libraries being installed.

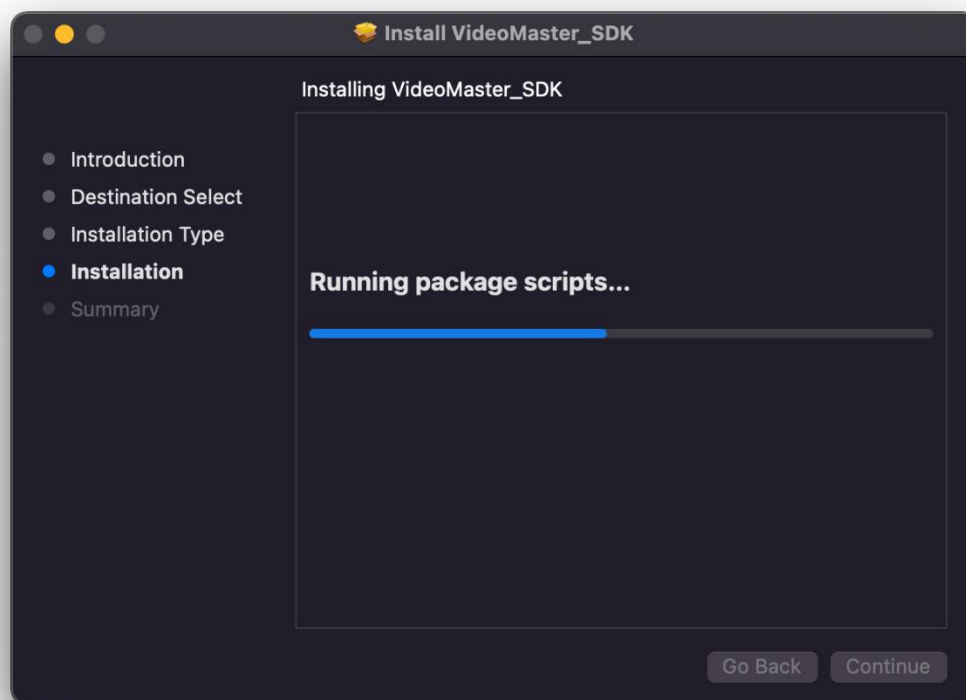
The **firmware updater service** corresponds to the FWUpdater executable, the FWUpdater viewer and their installation. This component needs the **device firmwares**. You can read more about the VideoMaster's firmware updater later in this document.

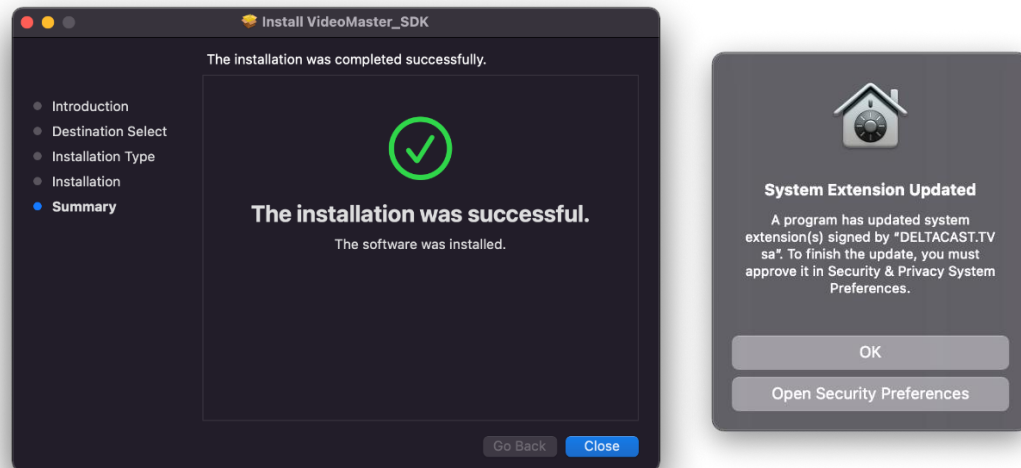


Once you are ready, click on the “Install” button to proceed.

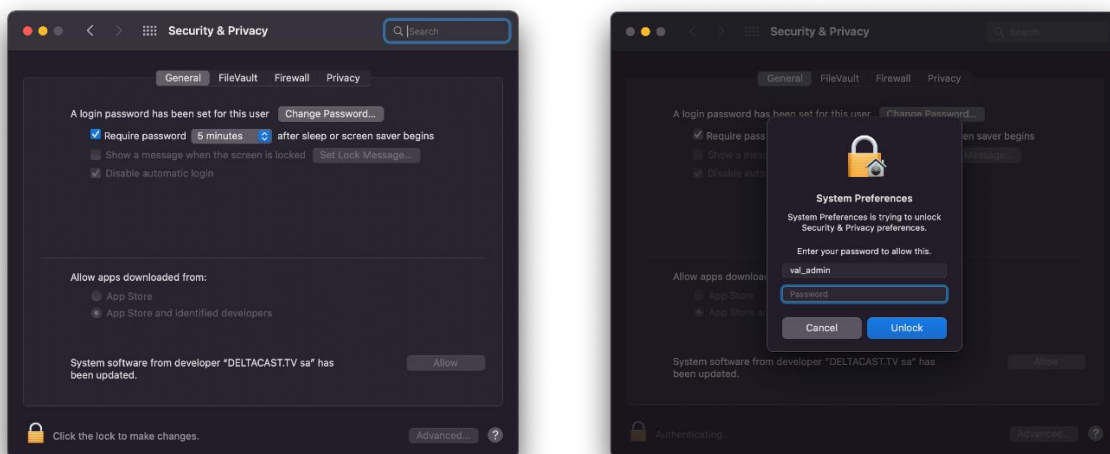


A new window appears to let you enter your *name* and *password* to begin the installation. Complete the fields and click *Install Software*.

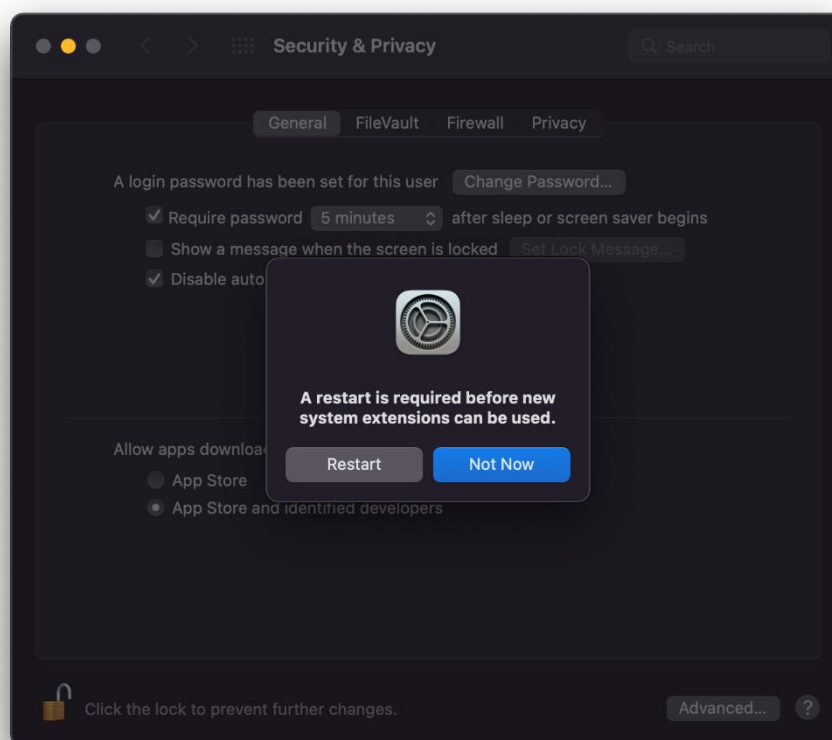




Once the installation complete close the installer using the *Close* button. At the same time a *System Extension Updated* warning pop-up. Click *Open Security Preference*.



In the *Security & Privacy* panel, click on the lock in the bottom left of the panel, enter your password and then click on *Unlock*.



After allowing the DELTACAST kext a new panel appears and asks you to restart the system.

It is strongly recommended not to click on "Not Now" and restart the system through the Apple menu. If the system is restarted this way the kext cache will be corrupted and the system will go into recovery mode on the next boot in order to allow the freshly installed kext.

Once the system rebooted the card firmware is updated if needed, in background, by the FWUpdater application. In this case trying to use the card within any application will return a "Firmware update in progress" error until the firmware update process ends.

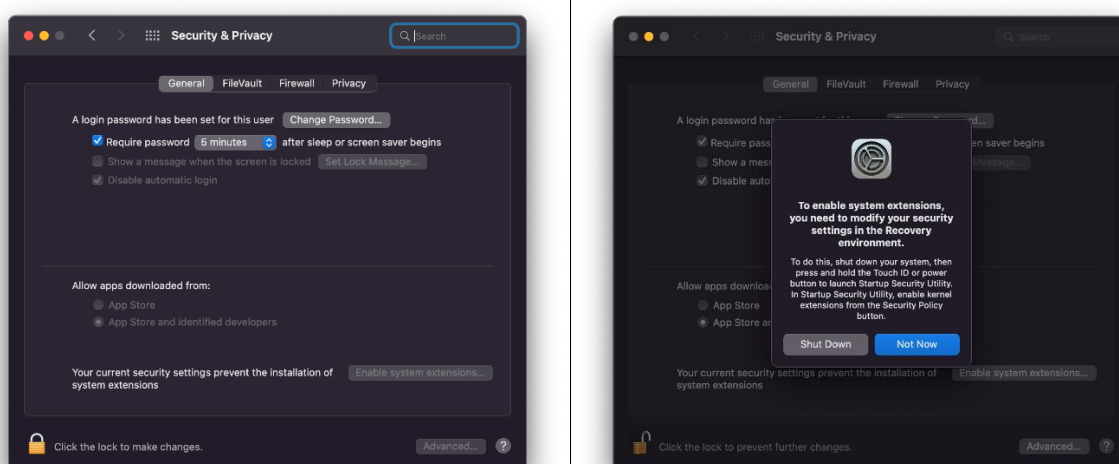
Once the firmware update ends the system has to be restarted so the new firmware is loaded. Trying to use the card within any application before the system is rebooted will return a "System needs restart" error.



Caution: *Firmware update operation during the installation step could take quite a long time (up to 3 minutes) if onboard firmware is being updated. Do not interrupt the installation process!*

5.2.4.4 Allowing system extension on Apple silicon (M1, M2, ...)

In case you install a DELTACAST card in an Apple silicon that has never had a kernel extension installed before you should be prompted to allow the system extension on the system before being able to allow the DELTACAST kext loading on the system. In this event the following panel requiring the user to enable system extensions.



Click on the lock in the bottom left of the panel, enter your password and then click on *Shut Down*.

Once the system powered off, press and maintain pressed the power button of the system during at least 10 seconds in order to boot in *Recovery Mode*.



In the first panel select the system you are installing the DELTACAST on and click *Security Policy*.



Then check *Reduced Security* and *Allow user management of kernel extensions from identified developers*. Click *OK*. Enter your password when you are asked to and click *OK*.

The new security policy is applied and the panel closes.

At this point you can shutdown the system using Apple menu, reboot it and allow the DELTACAST kext in the *Security & Privacy* panel such as explained in the previous chapter.

5.2.4.5 VideoMaster libraries

The VideoMaster libraries are a set of frameworks.

During the installation process, the core, audio, vbi and vbi data VideoMaster frameworks are automatically copied in `/Library/Frameworks`.

5.2.4.6 Kext loading authorization

The error code 27 (Kext loading error) means that the DELTACAST kext failed to load because it does not have the user approval.

In theory the system, at the first load of the DELTACAST kext, should ask the user to if he wants to unblock the kext or not.

If the system did not ask or if the user did not unblock the kext, then he has to go in the "Security and Privacy" settings to unblock it manually.

The following Apple's developer technical note explains how to do that:

5.2.4.7 Adding a DELTACAST devices to a system

Adding or replacing a DELTACAST device on a system already equipped with a DELTACAST device is transparent for the user. There is no need to re-install the driver and the FWUpdater service launched at startup will update the device firmware in background if needed.

Note that in event of firmware update, the system needs to be rebooted in order to finalize the update. Your DELTACAST device will not be functional unless you reboot.

5.2.4.8 Upgrading VideoMaster

To upgrade VideoMaster, repeat the installation procedure with the new VideoMaster package installer.

5.2.4.9 Uninstalling VideoMaster

The package installer app doesn't currently allow the automated uninstallation of VideoMaster. Although, if you wish to uninstall VideoMaster, an uninstallation script is provided under `/Applications/Deltacast/` and can be executed as follows:

```
sudo /Applications/Deltacast/uninstall_videomaster.sh
```

The script asks for a reboot once it has completed its operations. This action is mandatory before trying to perform any other VideoMaster installation. You can choose to perform it later but please be aware that not rebooting prior to installing the new package results in undefined behavior.

5.2.4.10 Upgrading from 6.25 to 6.25.1+

If you wish to upgrade from VideoMaster 6.25.0 to a later version, please make sure to uninstall the current version following the uninstall procedure described in the installation guide from 6.25.0.

5.2.4.11 Downgrading from 6.25.1+ to -6.25

If you wish to downgrade VideoMaster to an earlier version than 6.25.1, please make sure to uninstall the current version following the uninstall procedure described above.

6 CONFIGURATION

Some DELTACAST hardware devices support several different firmwares to implement different products. We call them configurations. The user can switch from one configuration to another one using the FWUpdater application, delivered with VideoMaster.

- On macOS the application is installed in >Library>Application Support>Deltacast
- On Windows the application is installed in C:\Program Files\deltacast\VideoMaster\tools\firmware_updater

7 PRODUCTS, DRIVERS and FIRMWARES

All the DELTACAST video cards share the same drivers named delta-x300. The FLEX gateway cards are handled by the delta-gwy drivers, and the FLEX modules use the flex-x400 drivers.

The following tables summarize driver and firmware needs of DELTACAST devices. Note that depending on the operating system, the driver extension differs: .sys extension for Windows and .kext extension for MacOS.

8 TROUBLESHOOTING

This chapter contains a series of known issues and their solutions.

This chapter is divided as follows:

If you have encountered problems installing or operating one DELTACAST hardware, browse through this list and locate the most appropriate case. If you cannot find the suitable solution in this list, please browse the DELTACAST web site, which contains an up-to-date troubleshooting section and a FAQ.

8.1 General

🕒 DELTACAST driver installation failed due to a hardware conflict

- 🔧 There could be a conflict with another device (such as a network controller). Try re-installing the driver after having removed all other non-essential devices and, once installed, re-install the removed cards.

🕒 My computer crashes after days and days of perfect running

- 🔧 Some components on the DELTACAST devices require adequate ventilation. Please ensure that your PC is correctly ventilated.
- 🔧 If your DELTACAST devices are well ventilated, please browse the DELTACAST web site and check for any driver or VideoMaster updates.

8.1.1 Windows

🕒 My Windows application does not see my DELTACAST device.

- 🔧 Check in the device manager if any error code are reported for the DELTACAST device and contact the DELTACAST support.

8.1.2 Mac OS

🕒 I have multiple devices connected but cannot properly operate them.

- 🔧 If an error is returned by the application handling those devices or if the devices behave unexpectedly (e.g. unknown board model), there could be a lack of shared memory preventing the SDK to work properly. In this case, the following values should be increased sufficiently:

```
sudo sysctl -w kern.sysv.shmmax=xxxxxxxxx
sudo sysctl -w kern.sysv.shmmin=1
```

```
sudo sysctl -w kern.sysv.shmseg=xx  
sudo sysctl -w kern.sysv.shmall=xxxx
```

For instance, doubling or quadrupling the default values would be a good start.

Please note that these values are not persistent and are lost after a reboot of the platform. To make them permanent, multiple solutions exist. One of them consists in placing a plist file into `/Library/LaunchDaemons/` which runs and sets the shared memory parameters on boot.

8.2 PCIe Cards

8.2.1 General

🕒 I cannot insert my DELTACAST card in a PCIe slot

- 👉 If you are installing your card in a new PC, PCIe slots may present some mechanical resistance as the card slides into the slot. Press the card strongly but carefully into the slot.

🕒 My computer will not boot since I installed one DELTACAST device

- 👉 The first issue could be that your card is not correctly positioned into its slot. In this case, turn off all power supplies and ensure that the card properly fits into the slot.
- 👉 Another possible issue is that a cable (IDE cable) or PC component (RAM module) has been accidentally moved and not correctly repositioned during the installation.

8.2.2 Windows

🕒 After having placed a DELTACAST device in my PC and re-started it, Windows did not prompted me to install a driver

- 👉 The DELTACAST device installation is done using a script provided in the redistributable package. Please refer to the installation chapter.

8.2.3 Docker containers

🕒 My application that is running in a Docker container has incoherent information about the cards installed.

- 👉 This typically means that the application is running in a different IPC namespace and/or does not have access to some shared memory context. Ensure that the main container is run with `--ipc=host` and other containers are run with the following options:

```
--ipc=container:name_of_main_container
```

```
--privileged access.
```

You also need to map `/dev/shm` using `-v/dev/shm:/dev/shm`.

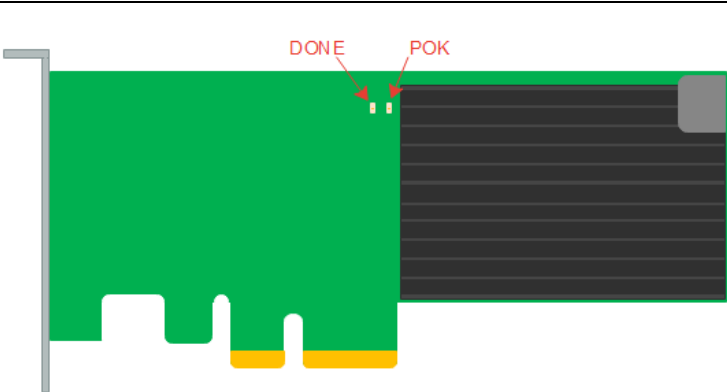
8.2.4 LED

DELTACAST cards include a series of LEDs giving information about their status and operating mode.

These LEDs can help you to troubleshoot and understand what is going on the card, and to communicate more efficiently with our technical support staff.

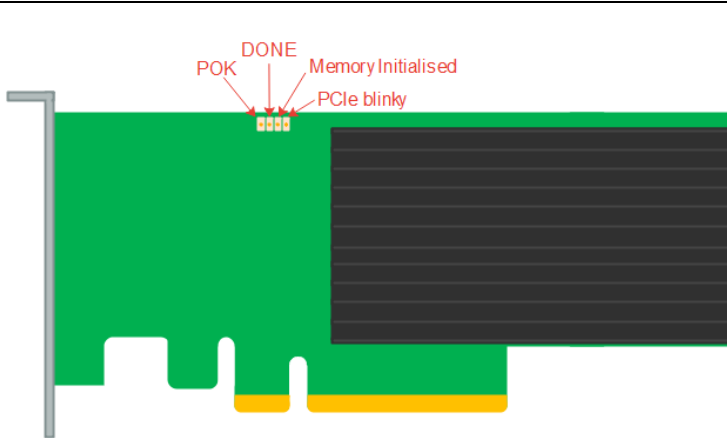
